portunity to live and work in the same home, Quarry Farm, where Twain spent some of his most productive summers in the 1870s and 1880s.

In addition to various editions of Twain's work, the collection includes photographs, books from Twain's library and the library at Quarry Farm, books and articles written about him, and microfilms of letters and manuscripts from the Mark Twain collections at the Bancroft Library in Berkeley, the Mark Twain Memorial in Hartford, Vassar College and the Huntington Library. Through the generosity of friends over the years, the collection has also acquired a fine collection of Mark Twain titles in languages other than English, the Love Collection of framed photographs and autographs, correspondence between Twain and members of his Elmira circle such as E.M. VanAken, Dr. Frank Darby and Julia Jones Beecher, letters written by Twain at the end of his life and other photographs and memorabilia that add greatly to the scope and interest of the collection.

The library, if anyone needs directions, is off Fifth Street between Columbia and Davis. It's next to the big new building that looks like a chateau. The parking lot opens on to Fifth street

August 18th was the 94th Anniversary of Women's right to vote under the ratification of the 19th Amendment. It took a long time for this to happen as we know. Below is an outline of what would be required if you choose to be a model.

Details

- Dresses are offered by The Dress Barn 795-0524, Horseheads (next to Michaels/Old Navy).
- All 10 Models make their own appointment to try on clothes by calling Dress Barn. Dates to try on clothes should be made for no more than 10 days ahead of show. Clothes that are selected are held out of inventory until the day of the show which is the reason for the

- 10 day window. Appointments can be made with anyone at the store. Ask for someone who is familiar with the AAUW Fashion Show.
- Each model comes in and tries on 3 outfits each from Holiday, Career and Casual attire. Three outfits total, one from each type of attire, are selected to be modeled on the day of the show.
- Each model receives a Modeling Coupon for regularly priced clothing.
- Models provide their own jewelry and shoes.
- Dress Barn brings the clothing to the Holiday Inn between 12 and 12:30 the day of the show. Models arrive at 12:30 to get ready to model.
- NOTE: Dress Barn does not have Petite sizes but petite ladies have been able to find things in certain styles.

Urge Senate to Act on Equal Pay

On Wednesday, for the first time ever, the Senate voted to move forward with a debate on the stalled Paycheck Fairness Act (S. 84/S. 2119). Thank you to everyone who contacted their senators in advance of this vote - we have the momentum!

This debate is long overdue. We hope Wednesday's bipartisan vote is a good-faith attempt to address an economic problem that has plagued women and their families for far too long.

Here's what comes next: Urge your senators to vote "yes" on the upcoming procedural vote to end debate and finally move to an up-ordown vote on the Paycheck Fairness Act.

AAUW members have been leading this fight since our first equal pay research in 1894, and we would like to remind Congress that equal pay has typically been bipartisan. We remember when thoughtful policy makers from both parties used to come together to develop solutions.

That's how it worked back in 1963, when the Equal Pay Act was passed. But that well-meaning law has clearly not been sufficient, nor has it been updated despite the persistent, well-documented gender pay gap that exists even between those with the same qualifications doing the same work.

The Senate needs to pass the Paycheck Fairness Act to give employees the tools they need to uncover and challenge unlawful pay discrimination. Specifically, the Paycheck Fairness Act (S. 84/S. 2199) would require employers to

prove that pay disparity is based on a legitimate business reason not related to gender, or due to seniority, merit, or productivity. It would also prohibit retaliation against workers who discuss or ask about salary information.

Your senators need to hear from you TODAY, before the next procedural vote – take two minutes to send a message urging them to support the Paycheck Fairness Act.

Your voices got us to this point where the Senate is finally recognizing the need to act. We hope that Wednesday's big vote in favor of debate (73-25) starts that trend and that the Senate moves to an up-or-down vote.

There's only one way to find out: Send a message to your senators today urging them to vote "yes" for an up-or-down vote on the Paycheck Fairness Act!


