#### Oral Arguments in King v. Burwell Begin at the Supreme Court

On Wednesday, March 4th, AAUW joined allies at a rally outside the Supreme Court as the justices heard oral arguments in King v. Burwell. The question in this case is whether the federal government was able to issue tax credits to millions of Americans who purchased health insurance in states where the federal government is running the health exchange. The plaintiffs argue that the language in the Affordable Care Act stipulates that only those who are enrolled in state-run health exchanges are eligible for tax credits. The Supreme Court's decision, expected in June, could determine whether millions of Americans who cannot afford health insurance without these subsidies will be able to continue to access health care. AAUW joined 67 other organizations in submitting an amicus brief arguing that tax credits should be available in all exchanges, noting that a decision restricting the tax credits to state-run exchanges would have significant implications for women's health and financial standing, as well as the health and well-being of their families.
