- Esther Baker Steele (1839-1911) was instrumental in the founding of Steele Memorial Library, contributing more that 6,000 books from her personal library. With her husband, Joel Dorman Steele, Esther researched wrote and published many teaching guides and textbooks. She is portrayed by Gail Lewis, an actress who has appeared in numerous area productions.
- Elizabeth Adams (died 1860), also known as Lear Green, escaped from slavery in the South by hiding in a trunk on a Philadelphia-bound ship. From there, she traveled by the Underground Railroad to Elmira. She is portrayed by Vicie Rollins, author, poet and performance artist.
- Harriet Maxwell Converse (1838-1903) was a poet, author and passionate advocate for Native Americans. She became the first woman named as a chief of the Six Nations. She married Frank Converse, a wealthy musician who invented the banjo. Portrayed by Margaret Kasper Reed, who is a published poet herself.
- Colonel John Hendy (1757-1840) was a Revolutionary

War Veteran who was born of immigrants from the island of Hendee off Ireland. After the war, he wanted more adventure and took his family upriver from Tioga Point to settle the town that was to become Elmira in 1788, He is portrayed by Michael Lavarnway, a local actor, director, musician and composer.

 Col. Joseph UpdeGraff of the Union Army and Thomas A.
"Buttons" Botts of the Confederate Army will be portrayed by Robert F. Lavarnway III. Rob is known from many area stages – the Clemens Center, Corning Community College, The Havana Glen Courthouse – to name a few.

Even in High-Paying STEM Fields, Women Are Shortchanged

AAUW's new research report, Solving the Equation: The Variables for Women's Success in Engineering and Computing, found that even in the two STEM fields with the most and highest-paying job opportunities, women face a pay gap.

An AAUW analysis of the U.S. Census Bureau's 2013 American Community Survey data found that overall, women in computer and mathematical occupations were paid 87 percent of what their male counterparts were paid. And in engineering and architecture, women were typically paid 82 percent of what their male counterparts were paid, or about \$65,000 annually, compared to \$79,000 for men. It seems that entering a high-paying field like engineering or computing still does not protect women against the pay gap.


tential employers were willing to offer male applicants a higher salary for a science lab manager position than they would offer to equally qualified female applicants.

There's plenty we can do to help close the gender pay gap in STEM, and in all fields. Companies can conduct job audits to ensure fairness and make their salary levels transparent. Women can also advocate on their own behalf by honing their negotiation skills and increasing their knowledge of the job market. We can all urge Congress to move on the long-stalled Paycheck Fairness Act. And of course you can join AAUW, where we'll keep focusing on achieving pay equity for women in all fields - however long it takes.
